



America's One Stop Operating System Consortium  
AOSOS Version 3.3 Provides States the Flexibility to Deal with Changing Workforce  
Program Requirements and EMILE

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America's One Stop Operating System (AOSOS) Consortium recently installed the thirteenth production build of its web-based case management and reporting system in Hawaii, Kentucky, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island and the Virgin Islands.

Consistent with the Consortium's strategic plan and commitment to delivery of value-added tools that support the One-Stop workforce development system, AOSOS version 3.3 includes major enhancements that position states to more easily address rapidly changing workforce program and reporting requirements. One enhancement, AOSOS' reengineered "custom tab" function, allows states to implement new data collection screens complete with business logic, search capabilities, and security through an easy to use administrative module. This functionality alone can save states hundreds of thousands of dollars in system enhancement costs from increasing federal data collection and reporting requirements.

Major system enhancements address needs of One-Stop customers and workforce staff. To facilitate services to One-Stop customers capable of helping themselves, AOSOS' self-service module has been upgraded to make the site more user-friendly and the resume builder easier to navigate. Workforce staff from One-Stop partner agencies are benefiting from enhanced inter-agency referral capabilities, improved security features, and modifications in virtually every system module.

Its development funded by the US Department of Labor and now supported by state subscriptions, AOSOS was developed and continues to be enhanced to meet the changing needs of the workforce system through a collaboration of state and local workforce professionals working through America's Job Bank Service Center (AJBSC) and New York based application developer, Navisite.

The Consortium continues to reap the benefits of fast-track development and delivery of a dynamic workforce development support system. Encouraged by enthusiastic and overwhelmingly positive responses from front line staff using AOSOS, the Consortium invites other states to take advantage of this application designed by and for workforce professionals. The system's multi-agency design makes it an effective tool for the diverse partners that share critical roles under the Workforce Investment Act (WIA).
